POLICE CHIEF KOLLER REVIEW OF HPD IMMIGRATION VIOLATION POLICY & POLICE PRACTICES





HAYWARD POLICE DEPARTMENT IMMIGRATION VIOLATIONS POLICY KEY POINTS

- The Hayward Police Department's priority is to ensure the public safety of the Hayward community
 - **To protect and serve everyone** who resides, works, shops, visits or travels through Hayward community equally regardless of their immigration status.
- Our policy formally commits all of our officers to equal enforcement of law
- As these concerns are addressed, our concerns remains to serve and protect our immigrant community from further victimization



HAYWARD POLICE DEPARTMENT IMMIGRATION VIOLATIONS POLICY KEY POINTS

- HPD does not and will not function as an arm of the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency (ICE)
- HPD does not possess the training, authority, or access to data bases needed to confirm the multitude of potential authorizations which allow immigrants to remain in the United States (*e.g. student, work, travel, or other related visa's, emergency approvals, passports, resident alien status, etc.*).



HAYWARD POLICE DEPARTMENT IMMIGRATION VIOLATIONS POLICY KEY POINTS

- HPD officers do not participate in independent sweeps or other concentrated efforts to detain suspected undocumented workers
- Are prohibited by policy from participating in any efforts solely designed to identify and detain undocumented residents
- HPD does not recognize or respond to immigration detainers pertaining to individuals held in our city jail



HAYWARD POLICE DEPARTMENT IMMIGRATION VIOLATIONS POLICY KEY POINTS

- HPD northern and southern district commanders are meeting with community representatives to provide those assurances.
- HPD has a history of finding safe solutions:
 - Hayward Day Labor Center:**
 - Collaborative response to associated crime and victimization
 - Provided a safe location for day laborers
 - Supported participation of all laborers, regardless of immigration status
 - From its inception, the goal was to protect the laborers and had no interest in addressing their immigration status

WHAT IS A SANCTUARY CITY?

- No formal definition or legal construction of what it means to be a sanctuary city.
- Generally, City (or other agency) that has formally welcomed refugees and/or undocumented workers
- Most believe “sanctuary” refers to jurisdictions that attempt to limit their cooperation with federal immigration officials or ICE.



WHAT A SANCTUARY CITY IS NOT...

- Federal immigration laws and law enforcement agencies still have authority in cities. We cannot prevent them from coming into our community.
- Local police, officials, and employees **do not** have the authority to stop federal laws or enforcement activities.
- People living in sanctuary cities are still subject to federal immigration enforcement actions

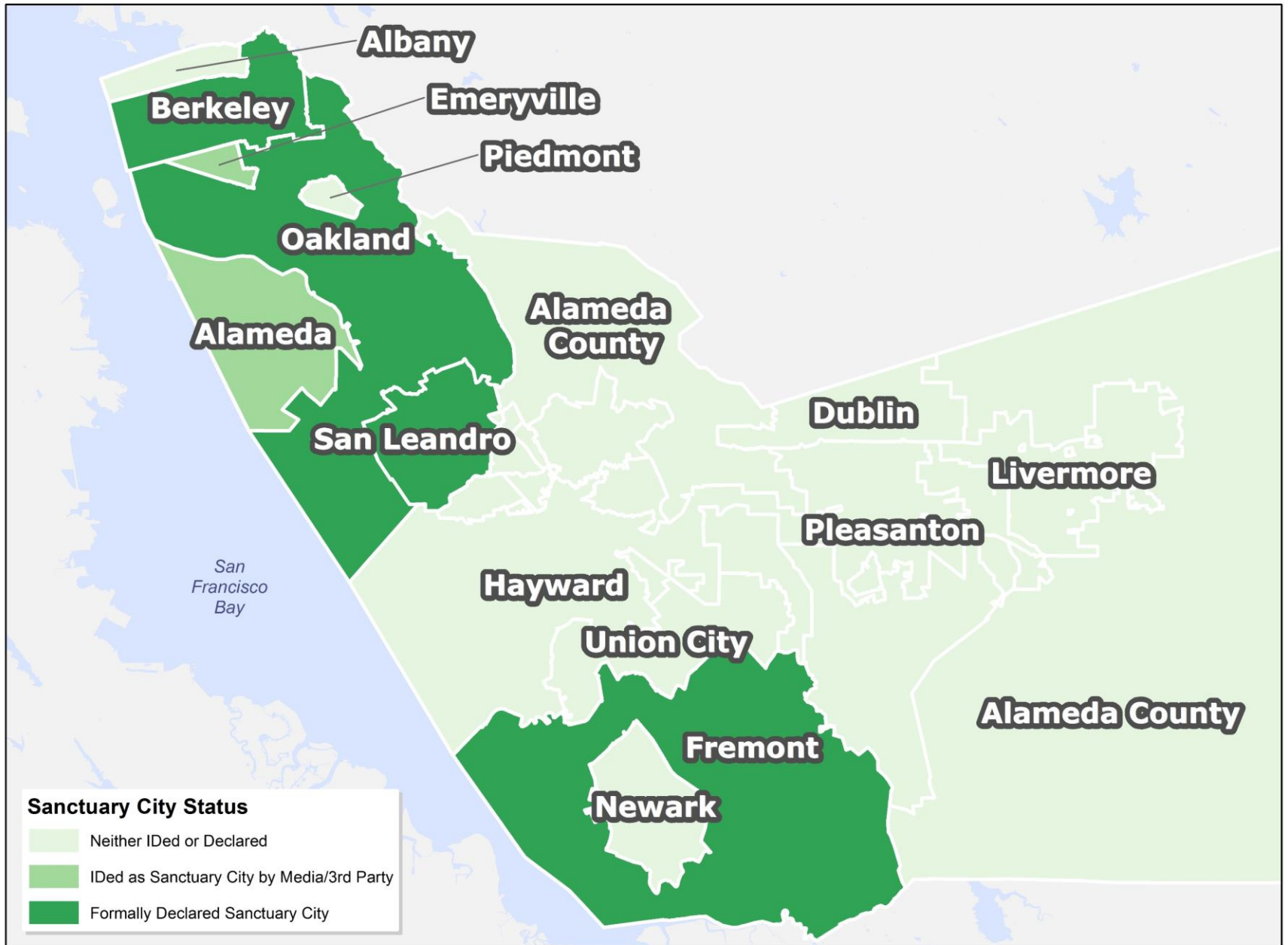

WHAT DOES BEING A SANCTUARY CITY MEAN?

- Formal Declaration that Police Departments Not cooperate with INS
- Uncertain whether formal sanctuary city declarations puts cities at risk for losing current federal funding
- No **official** list, but on the lookout for cities that are considered sanctuary cities (includes 3rd party lists & news)
- Hayward has approximately \$33 million dollars of current and future federal funding
